“The Technological Prospects of New Indian Criminal Laws-2024”
April 22-26, 2024

In recent times, with the advent of new technologies and the evolving nature of criminal activities, the parliament of India has introduced three significant criminal laws aimed at addressing emerging challenges while leveraging technological advancements. These laws aimed at modernizing the legal framework and addressing contemporary challenges. These laws will replace the British-era Indian Penal Code, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the Indian Evidence Act of 1872.

The primary objective of this workshop is to delve into the technological aspects embedded within the three new Indian criminal laws: "Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita," "Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita," and "The Bharatiya Sakshya Adhinyam." Participants will gain insights into the innovative use of technology within these legal frameworks and its impact on law enforcement, justice delivery, and citizen security.

This workshop is tailored for research scholars and faculty members of technical institutes, technology experts, policymakers, and scholars specializing in law and technology.

The agenda of the workshop are:

- 1) Getting an overview of the three laws: "Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita," "Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita," and "The Bharatiya Sakshya Adhinyam", highlighting the advancements integrated into each law and the way these are the replacement of IPC.
- 2) Exploration of digital forensic techniques, cybercrime investigation methodologies, and electronic evidence admissibility.
- 3) Discussion on challenges faced by law enforcement agencies in adopting and implementing technological solutions.
- 4) Discussion on cyber law enforcement capabilities and collaboration between law enforcement agencies and technology experts.
- 5) Identification of best practices for leveraging technology to enhance the efficacy and fairness of the criminal justice system.
- 6) Analysis of legal frameworks governing data privacy, surveillance, and electronic evidence collection.
- 7) Exploration of future technological trends and their potential impact on the evolution of Indian criminal laws.
